# Bob Summers Evening Demonstration Basics of Bowl Turning

The June meetings evening demonstration was given by Bob Summers on the basics of turning a bowl. Bowl turning has it's variations, but the basic fundamental steps are usually pretty much the same no matter who's doing it. Bob's demonstration showed the use of the screw chuck, the scroll chuck and the swept back gouge. Starting and finishing steps were discussed and samples of various bowl types were passed around. # Truths of Woodturning

### #4. Finishing is half the battle

When you're finished with the woodwork, you're only halfway done. While we all love to work wood, most of us dread finishing. We enjoy being precise and finicky when making a project, but most of us hate the sanding and the cleanup required for a perfect finish. However, when we skimp, we usually get poor results. Glue spills show up suddenly when finish is applied. Or we find sanding scratches or flaws in surfaces that are supposed to be perfect. The undeniable truth is that the finishing is as important as the woodworking, and it frequently takes almost as long.

## #5. Practice makes perfect

When we decide to undertake a new project, we can't wait to jump right in and get to work. However, woodworking is a bundle of skills that are polished by practice. That's why your parents and teachers told you, ad nauseam, "Practice makes perfect." The truth is that the quality of your projects is better if you are not learning the skills on the job. It is wise to try unfamiliar skills on some scrap first.

# #6. Dry-fit before glue-up

This is one of the first things to go wrong when we are rushing. It also can be the result of over-confidence. Other times we simply forget. Whatever the excuse, dry fitting saves a lot of grief. Joints that are too tight can lock up when glue hits them, and freeze before coming together completely. Basically, you don't want to be scrambling around or discovering any nasty surprises after the glue has been spread and the clock is ticking fast.


