

## This n' That

#### Soft-touch live center for fine finials

When turning small, thin finials, I sometimes have trouble stabilizing the tip at the tailstock end to keep it from whipping around without damaging it. My solution was to use a small piece of ¼"- (6mm-) diameter aquarium tubing inserted into the opening of a mandrel saver live center. I cut notches in the tubing every 90 degrees and



inserted the end of the workpiece into the tubing to stabilize it. Because the small end of the finial will turn in unison with the mandrel saver, the finial will not get marred.

#### O-ring bowl base

Here's an idea that came from the kitchen. My wife has a two-quart plastic mixing bowl with a rubber ring around the bottom. It sets down softly and doesn't slide, so I thought I would give it a try on a turned wooden bowl (*Photo 1*).





When turning the bowl, leave the bottom footless and bring the side of the bowl right up to the tenon. Then use a  $\frac{3}{6}$ " (5mm) parting tool to form a groove around the bottom to accept a  $\frac{3}{6}$ "-thick × 3"- (8cm-) outside-diameter O-ring. The groove is  $\frac{3}{2}$ " (2mm) deep and just a shade over 3" outside diameter. This sizing will allow the O-ring to be stretched slightly to fit into the groove (*Photo 2*).

I typically apply finish to the bowl, remove the tenon, and then glue the O-ring in place. I then apply finish to the bottom of the bowl inside the O-ring. This is where I find a big advantage: I no longer need to be concerned with having the finish on the bottom meet up with the finish on the outside of the bowl in a smooth and unnoticeable manner.

O-rings are available online in lots of sizes. I like the \%" thickness, and I have 3" and 4\%"- (10cm-) diameter rings. Give it a try.
